5 Facts About Marijuana That Can Harm Our Kids

Marijuana is a harmful drug, especially to our kids. Studies show that regular use by adolescents leads to lower academic achievement and mental health problems. Early, regular, and long-term use can result in a 6-8 point drop in IQ.

It is increasingly potent. Today's marijuana has an average THC content of 15%, compared to the 4% of the 1990's. It is being smoked, put in food, candies or beverages and being made even more potent converting it to hash oil (with 60%+

Marijuana is addictive. 17% of those who start using marijuana in their teens become addicted. The addiction rate for daily users jumps to 25-50%.
